new Medical Director. Two years ago we began searching for a pro-life


BEATA AND CAMELLIA, AND JOE

Passing into eternal life on the Solemnity of St. Joseph, sidewalk prayer warrior Joe Manning was, like his patron, a

quiet channel through which Almighty God performed a miracle that is the Center's most widely known story of a life and a soul saved.

When Beata became pregnant, she felt unprepared and incapable. "I remember immediately considering abortion because I just couldn't imagine how I would measure up to being somebody else's parent," she stated.

She also admitted to feeling deeply ashamed. "There was something so disappointing to me

about how I chose to exercise my femininity and how I didn't consider my ability to mother."

Correspondingly, she was not comfortable with the thought of an abortion. "It occurred to me that I am not the victim. There is someone else to consider and I need to step up to that." Secretly, she prayed to God to help her find another way.

While Beata wrestled with self-doubt, no one she knew offered any encouragement. Her boyfriend simply rejected fatherhood and insisted upon abortion. The weather was overcast, windy and cold when they drove to her appointment.

Yet, nothing at the Center stands on its own; personnel, goods and services would not exist without our supportive family.

"The Rose Gala sealed the deal," Donna reported. "The love of the warm, friendly people whom I'd never met. Listening to them and the testimonies, I felt very comfortable, that this is where I am meant to be. That, and the chapel, such a beautiful chapel." Inspired, she joined our team.

Although the Center covers her licensing fees, Donna is unconditionally not accepting compensation. She takes volunteerism very seriously and lives it generously.

Loren is ecstatic about working beside Donna. "You can tell that she truly cares, loves to do this, and appreciates the setting wherein she can be very generous with her time. She is the doctor everybody would want: genuinely concerned and very compassionate."

The template for doctors in hospitals is 30-40 ultrasounds per day with only 4 - 5 minutes per patient. "It's onerous," Donna noted. "Here, it is quite lovely to be able to get to know the mothers and see how they need direction, support and encouragement, which they don't receive in other settings."

A VERY VALANCY CHRISTMAS

Visiting the Center on Feb. 10 with a memorial donation of Christmas baby gifts, Erin & Justin Baro also bestowed on us something greater: their personal witness to the humanity of babies in the womb. With their permission we share with you these excerpts from Erin's sweet letter.

"Valancy Stirling Baro was born on Saturday, April 7, 2018 at 9:53 a.m. I delivered her at 25 weeks, 3 days gestation, and she weighed 1 pound, 3 ounces. My health was declining rapidly as she was born, but I am beyond grateful that through the haze I still heard Valancy cry. This would be the only time my husband and I would hear her voice.

"Valancy was an impeccable, feisty, beautiful baby. She immediately locked eyes with her daddy, and that fatherdaughter bond was irrevocably forged. Over the next four weeks, we delighted in learning everything about her.



Dear Mother of Life Pregnancy Center,

Welcome to A Very Valancy Christmas! We are honored to bring you these gifts in honor of our daughter.

After only five days of hospitalization due to severe preeclampsia, Valancy Stirling Baro was born on Saturday, April 7, 2018 at 9:53am. I delivered her at 25 weeks, 3 days gestation, and she weighed 1 pound, 3 ounces. My health was declining rapidly as she was born, but I am beyond grateful that through the haze, I still heard Valancy cry. This would be the only time my husband and I would hear her voice.

Valancy was an impeccable, feisty, beautiful baby. She immediately locked eyes with her daddy, and that father-daughter bond was irrevocably forged. Over the next 4 weeks, we delighted in learning everything about her. Valancy had dark hair like Justin, and she often furrowed her brow as he does. Her eyes were very dark, and we loved seeing her turn her head to follow our voices. She loved her hands, and she was happiest having them by her face, touching her head, behind her ears, and under her chin. Several times we watched her trying to figure out how to get her thumb in her mouth; when she succeeded, she sucked furiously.



Valancy loved to be fed. At this stage of prematurity, she received breast milk through a feeding tube. She received her care every three hours, and before she was fed, she'd get excited and antsy as any newborn does. Part of feeding included mouth care, when Justin or I dipped a swab in milk and allowed Valancy to suck on it. She loved it; she'd sometimes suck so hard you couldn't pull the swab out of her mouth!

Another part of care included taking Valancy's temperature and changing her diaper. Justin became a pro quickly, and we had many laughs about how messy it could be. Valancy at her young age was no different than any other baby. That means she also fidgeted and quite often didn't like being changed or having her temp checked. Had she not been on a breathing tube, we would've heard those cries!



I was blessed to hold Valancy twice, the first at 8 days old and the second at 10 days old. The most amazing NICU nurse advocated to make skin-to-skin happen as soon as possible. Valancy was so warm, and she curled her tiny fingers on my skin, occasionally scratching at me. When I held her, her stats were the best they had ever been; her oxygen saturation was perfect. Unfortunately, Valancy needed to change ventilators on Day 12, and her new one didn't allow for being held.

Justin and I were with Valancy from early morning to late at night, and we sometimes slept over. We quickly earned a reputation with the staff for our devotion. When Valancy's attending doctors were switching 3 weeks in, our new doctor asked where I lived. I said, "Lincoln", but Valancy's prior doctor corrected me to "101 Dudley". He commented on how Justin and I were present for every round – W&I wants this, encourages this, and asks for this from parents, but we had the impression it wasn't common.

Justin and I enjoyed reading to Valancy. She is named for the Lucy Maud Montgomery character, Valancy Stirling, from <u>The Blue</u> <u>Castle</u>. We were reading this to her, and I also read her my favorite original Grimm's Fairy Tales. We loved touching her between care times. She had constant visitors, and we decorated her room with cards and stuffed animals from her family. I had drawers stuffed with clothes, and we stocked the fridge in the family center. It was our home for 29 days. It wasn't how most parents spend their first month with a newborn, but it was our normal. Our beautiful daughter, who was ooohed over by staff, was forever in that incubator except for twice being held. We didn't think to complain because we were confident it was temporary. We loved it because we love her, and this is how we were parenting.



When Valancy was 23 days old, she came down with pneumonia. I never spent another night away from her as she fought. Our brave, strong girl's lungs were too severely damaged though, and on Sunday, May 6, 2018, at 29 days old, the fight was over. Valancy's amazing staff helped to transition her to Justin so he could hold his daughter for the first time. Our family was able to kiss her and say good-bye. She was then given to me, and the mother who brought her into this world held her as she left us.

Our family's grief is immeasurable, so finding ways to honor Valancy is necessary. Her uncle wanted his family to still gift her for her first Christmas, and thus A Very Valancy Christmas was born. The idea is to buy gifts which Justin and I will donate. The idea grew when we shared it with friends and family; the response has been overwhelming, and this year is no different. We are blown away by the generosity and love shown to us and Valancy.

This year we chose the Mother of Life Pregnancy Center, because your mission is one we strongly support. As a pro-life family, we want to play a small part in helping mothers, their children, and pregnancies in crisis. We have also lost three babies in utero since Valancy's death (Oliver, Peregrine, and Kilmeny), and each one is precious and deeply loved, just like their big sister, Valancy, a spunky daddy's girl with personality who knew her parents by sight and sound, who was beautiful, and who was unique. We are thrilled to give her gifts to other beautiful, unique, and precious children.
